You don't need to take a direct path to your future job, but it's important to have a plan, in fact have at least two so if something goes wrong you have a back up!

You can leave school at the end of the school year in which you turn 16, but you are expected to continue to receive some training and education until you reach the age of 18.

Making Plans

Start by identifying the things you will need such as Qualifications, skills and experience

Ready for Independence?

As you take steps to becoming an adult in legal terms you'll need:

A NI number

A bank account

ID

If you lose your NINO open a personal tax account on the gov.uk website and you can print off a confirmation letter with it on!

At 16, except in some rare cases, it's legally your own decision to change your name, you can use a statutory declaration or deed poll to do this.

Consider

If you begin full time employment (e.g. an apprenticeship) and your household is receiving benefits or tax reductions based on your status as being in full time education this may be affected.

Financial help is available in many forms depending on eligibility. Your provider can talk you through options and refer you to external help if it will benefit you.

Your provider will have a department called "student support services" or similar. They will always have a designated safeguarder who can help with matters regarding your mental and physical safety and welfare.
