

# Legal Requirements until you turn 18

Since a change in law in 2013, young people are now required to stay in some form of education or training until their 18th birthday.

This change was made to give you more opportunities to gain the qualifications you need to succeed in the future.

It also allows you to develop your knowledge and practical skills, so you have a wide range of experience to offer to different employers.

This digital guide has been created to give you an introduction to the various choices available to you for education and training after turning 16 so you can feel informed about what comes next.

# Making Informed Decisions

From Year 9 onwards, you should be having regular reviews around preparing for adulthood. Make the most of the help on offer in these careers lessons, ask questions, and look at all the options available.

It's also a good idea to talk about your future choices with your family and friends, subject teachers, and careers advisors. Here's some of the things to consider:

- Think about how you like to learn and what support you've needed to learn most effectively at school
- Look at various career paths that courses may lead to if you see a career that interests you, make a note of it and research the qualifications required
- If you are considering a career that will require you to go to University, do some research into the courses and their entry requirements

- Think about your talents, interests, and the things you enjoy doing
- If you think an apprenticeship, traineeship or internship might suit you better, explore the differences between these and find out what vocational study routes are available
- Visit open days and careers events at schools, colleges and training providers and research the courses on offer at each, as well as the enrichment offer

# Changes to **GCSEs**

GCSE grading has changed. Instead of being graded A\* to G, they are graded 9 to 1.

Grade 4 is recognised as a 'standard pass', which means that this is the minimum level that you need to achieve in English and Maths, otherwise you may need to continue studying these subjects as part of your 16+ education. Achievement of a Grade 5 or above is recognised as a 'strong pass', although some subjects may require a grade 6 or above, in order for you to study them post-16.

## **WHAT'S CHANGED?**



The updated qualifications feature some new topics and more demanding content.



In the past, GCSEs were divided into modules and students were assessed by module. Now, the focus has changed to final exams covering the whole two-year syllabus, rather than smaller assessments throughout this period.



Exams are the main method of assessment and there is far less coursework, except where skills need to be tested in other ways, such as drama.



On the whole, higher- and foundation-tier papers have disappeared, with the exception of Maths, sciences and modern foreign languages.

# **Qualifications**Explained



### ENTRY LEVEL

Entry Level Qualifications are available at three sub-levels: Entry-Level 1, 2 and 3. Entry Level 3 is the most difficult. There are no entry requirements; Entry Level qualifications are open to anyone interested in gaining a recognised qualification. You can progress from one Entry Level to the next. When you reach Entry Level 3, the qualifications are designed to help you move onto further Level 1 or Level 2 qualifications.

## LEVEL 1

**Level 1 Qualifications** provide basic knowledge and skills. They will give you access to the next level qualification.

# LEVEL 2

**Level 2 Qualifications** demonstrate good knowledge and understanding of a subject. Gaining a Level 2 qualification will mean that you are suitable for many job roles. To study for a Level 2 qualification, you would normally need GCSEs grades D-G/3-1, or a Level 1 qualification in a similar subject (i.e. Functional Skills).

## LEVEL 3

**Level 3 Qualifications** give you the ability to gain or apply a range of knowledge, skills and understanding at a detailed level. They are appropriate if you plan to progress onto higher education. To study for a Level 3 qualification, you would normally need GCSEs grades A\*-C/9-4, or a Level 2 qualification in a similar subject,

## LEVEL 4+

**Qualifications at Level 4 and above** demonstrate specialist, high level knowledge in an area of work or study. Completing a Level 4 qualification would allow you to progress onto Higher Level qualifications, such as Level 5 (Foundation Degree), Level 6 (Bachelor's Degree), Level 7 (Master's Degree) and Level 8 (Doctoral Degree).

# Further Education

Further Education (FE) refers to education after secondary school that is not part of higher education. Usually this is undertaken between the ages of 16 and 19. You could choose to study in a School Sixth Form, a Sixth Form College or a Further Education College.

ACADEMIC OR VOCATIONAL?

Academic qualifications tend to be subject-based and are taught in a classroom setting at college or sixth form, usually with an exam at the end. Vocational qualifications are career- or skills-based and take a more practical,

hands-on approach. They can be taught in a classroom, on-the-job or a mixture of both and involve a combination of exams, coursework and practical assessments.

There is no right or wrong choice. There is only what's right for you and how you prefer to learn. Some subjects overlap and you can choose to study the academic or vocational course.

Remember there are lots of ways to study a subject you love!

# Studying A-Levels

A-Levels (Advanced Level) are subjectbased qualifications that are studied over two years. They allow you to study the GCSE subjects you are interested in to a high level, or choose new ones.

Over the two years, you will develop your knowledge and learn transferable skills.

Assessments typically take place at the end of year two. Unlike reformed GCSEs (using the 9-1 grading scale), A-Levels are still graded A\*-E.


When choosing an A-Level subject, you may want to consider taking a facilitating subject as they help you keep your options open when choosing a degree or further study options.

Facilitating subjects are the subjects most commonly required or preferred by universities or to get on to a range of degree courses.

The Russell Group, which represents 24 leading UK universities, defines facilitating subjects as:

- Biology
- Chemistry
- Physics
- English Literature
- Maths

- Further Maths
- History
- Geography
- Modern Languages
- Classical Languages





#### **TECHNICAL**

# Studying T-Levels

T-Levels (Technical Levels) are Level 3 qualifications for post-16 students who have an idea about the occupation they wish to pursue.

They are vocational and will equip you with the specialist knowledge you need for a specific recognised occupation, such as engineering, construction, computing / digital skills, healthcare, education, or accounting/finance. They are a two-year course and one T-Level is equivalent to three A-Levels. You spend 80% of your time in a classroom and 20% on an industrial placement lasting at least 315 hours (approx. 45 days).

T-Level qualifications prepare you for a specific technical occupation. These qualifications have been developed alongside employers to make sure that what you learn meets the needs of industry and prepares you for work. Because of this they have been recognised by employers as excellent preparation for specific job roles.

# **Vocational** Qualifications

Vocational Qualifications are practical, work based courses designed to help you acquire the skills and knowledge needed to do a particular job, progress in the workplace or continue education.

Unlike more academic courses, like A-Levels or T-Levels, they combine a mix of theory and practical learning, and you'll probably do some work experience too. There's a huge range of courses that you can choose from, with qualifications ranging from entry level to advanced. The length of the course depends on what level you study at.

Examples of vocational subjects include Accounting, Animal care, Beauty Therapy, Engineering, Food Technology, Health and Social Care, IT, Logistics, Media and Communications, and Retail.

#### **Level 1 Vocational Courses**

Level 1 courses give you a good grounding in the skills, knowledge and experiences in areas including Public Services, Health & Social Care, Hair and Beauty, or Construction Trades. They are a good starting point if you want to progress to a Level 2 course or an Apprenticeship. Some providers offer Level 1 courses in Employability Skills to help you prepare for the world of work.

### **Level 2 Vocational Courses**

Vocational Courses are also offered at Level 2 in a variety of areas e.g. Art & Design, Creative Media, Health & Social Care, Business and IT. They will provide you with knowledge and understanding of that particular vocational area.

#### **Level 3 Vocational Courses**

Applied General Qualifications are Level 3 qualifications for post-16 students wishing to undertake a broad study of a specific vocational area.

They are ideal if you want to continue your education through learning applied to a job area or industry sector e.g. Arts, Crafts, Media and Publishing, Business or IT/Technology.

The most common Applied General Qualifications studied at Level 3 are BTECs and NVQs, although these can be studied at Levels 1 (equivalent to GCSE) to 8 (equivalent to post-graduate degree).

#### **BTECs**

Vocational Courses are also offered at Level 2 in a variety of areas e.g. Art & Design, Creative Media, Health & Social Care, Business and IT. They will provide you with knowledge and understanding of that particular vocational area.

#### **NVQs**

National Vocational Qualifications (NVQs) are a great choice for those who want to combine working and learning. They are based on national occupational standards for each career sector (that is, lists of skills and knowledge that employers say you need to work in a particular sector).

# Other Qualifications

Whilst (or instead of) studying A-Levels, T-Levels or Vocational Qualifications, you can also opt for other qualifications that you can study at college, sixth form or alongside other qualifications with an independent training provider.

**GCSEs** 

GCSEs are highly valued by schools, colleges and employers. You may have the opportunity to re-sit GCSE Maths and English if you did not achieve the grades you needed or were hoping for. Other GCSEs may be available to develop your understanding of a certain subject.

### **Entry Levels**

There are over 100 Entry Level certificates to choose from including traditional subjects such as English, Maths and Science. Entry Level

qualifications are made up of a number of separately assessed units. Assessments can be a combination of exams, assignments and tasks which can be written, oral, or practical.

#### **Technical Baccalaureate**

Introduced in 2014, the TechBac are practical, vocational, courses run by the City and Guilds aimed at 16-19-year-olds wanting technical qualifications and what are known as soft skills. TechBac students are recognised by employers as being work ready making them eminently employable and likely to be snapped up and working as soon as they finish their course. Not only do they show you have technical qualifications, but they provide evidence of soft skills.

TechBac courses are measured in hours. Level 2 TechBacs can cover 360 hours of learning, while an Advanced Technical Extended Diploma will take 1080 hours.

# Studying Traineeships

Traineeships are available for young people aged 16-19 and for young people aged up to 25 who have learning difficulties and disabilities.

Traineeships last up to six months and include a work experience placement as well as English and Maths education. You can retain an Education Health and Care Plan whilst undertaking a traineeship. Employers are not required to pay you whilst undertaking a traineeship, but you may still be supported with expenses for things like travel and meals and will continue to get any benefits you currently receive.

Traineeships are designed to help prepare you to do an apprenticeship. After completing one, you could also apply for a permanent job with your employer if one is available, use the work experience you've gained to find a job with a different employer, or go onto further study now you know more about your chosen career path.

You can contact your local colleges or training providers to see if they have any traineeship opportunities or search online.

# Studying an **Apprenticeship**


Apprenticeships combine practical training in a job with study. There are 1,500+ different job roles available, such as Business, Construction, Media and Engineering.

Apprentices are employed for a minimum of 30 hours per week and earn a real wage whilst studying towards a nationally recognised qualification. If you have an EHCP (Education Health Care Plan), you can retain it and have it reviewed while undertaking an Apprenticeship.

Training is delivered by a college, training provider or University; this may be at the employer's workplace, at the college/training centre, or delivered as e-learning.

To achieve an Apprenticeship, you will need to work towards a Standard or Framework and you will be assessed on these throughout your Apprenticeship. You will spend at least 20% of your time studying for your qualification, and your employer will give you time for study.

If you do not have GCSE English and Maths (grade A\*-C/9-4), you will be required to complete






functional skills English and Maths as part of your Apprenticeship (unless you have an exemption). Depending on the type of Apprenticeship, you may also be required to complete Functional Skills ICT.

Apprenticeships last a minimum of 12 months, but can take several years to complete depending on the course, the level and your working hours.

### **Levels of Apprenticeship**

It's important to read the entry requirements before you apply for an Apprenticeship. If you have the qualifications and experience for the Apprenticeship level you want, then you can apply straight away.

However, if you have no previous qualifications or experience in the sector that you would like to get an Apprenticeship in, it may be necessary to start at an Intermediate Level and learn the basics before you can complete the Higher Levels.



## **Applying for Apprenticeships**

Similar to a real job, you will need to submit an application and attend an interview to gain an Apprenticeship.

## **HIGHER & DEGREE APPRENTICESHIPS**

Higher & Degree Apprenticeships are a real alternative to traditional University study.

You can gain your qualification, learn professional skills, progress your career and earn a wage. Higher Apprenticeships are available at Levels 4-7. Levels 4 and 5 are equivalent to a Higher Education Certificate / Diploma or a foundation degree. Degree Apprenticeships are a type of Higher Apprenticeship at Levels 6 or 7 and you can achieve a full bachelor's and master's degrees respectively.

Over 40 different subjects are currently covered, representing hundreds of job roles - for example, accounting, business and

administration, construction management and level services.

### **Degree Apprenticeships**

For a Degree Apprenticeship, training and assessments are carried out by a Higher Education Institution (HEI). This may involve you attending a University for part of your Apprenticeship.

Degree Apprenticeships combine both higher and vocational education and fully test both the wider occupational competence and academic learning.

# **SEND** Provision

16 to 18 year olds with an Education Health and Care (EHC) Plan will receive an Annual Review in Year 10 to help you start thinking about your next steps. In Year 11, your school will arrange for you to speak to a careers advisor, explore your options and apply for education or training.

At 16, you can choose to stay in full-time education (at a mainstream or special sixth form or college) or combine volunteering, work and study. In addition to the academic (like A-Levels or T-Levels) or vocational qualifications (like BTECs or Apprenticeships), you could also choose a Supported Internship.

## SUPPORTED INTERNSHIPS

Supported Internships are structured study programmes for learners with Special Educational Needs and Disabilities, run by colleges or providers in partnership with local employers. They normally last for a year and include an unpaid work placement for at least six months, plus Maths and English support if required.

### LOCAL OFFER

The Local Offer website provides information about local services and opportunities for young people in Stockport with special educational needs and disabilities (SEND) and their families. It includes information about education, training, health and social care options.

# Higher **Education**

Higher Education (HE) is the continuation of study post-18. UK HE offers a diverse range of courses and qualifications that are recognised and respected by employers and academics worldwide.

HE applications tend to be very competitive, and providers may ask for at least Grade 5 at GCSE, with work experience often an advantage to you.

### **HNC & HND**

Higher National Certificates (HNC) and Higher National Diplomas (HND) are work-related, higher education qualifications; they are Level 4 and Level 5 qualifications respectively.

Both qualifications focus on 'learning by doing' and give you skills that you can use in a particular job. They are provided by further and higher education colleges. HNCs take on year to complete full-time, whilst HNDs take two years to complete full-time. Alternatively, they can both be taken part-time.

### **Foundation Degree**

A Foundation Degree focuses on a particular job or profession and is a combined academic and vocational qualification, equivalent to two-thirds of a Bachelor's Degree. They usually take two years full-time to complete, or longer for part-time students.

### **Bachelor's Degree**

A Bachelor's Degree is the most common and widely available type of undergraduate qualification, with thousands of courses available. Typically, it takes three to four years of full-time study to complete a Bachelor's Degree, although certain courses run for much longer. The two most common Bachelor's Degrees are Bachelor of Arts (BA) and Bachelor of Science (BSc).

### **PGCert PGDip**

Postgraduate Certificates (PGCert) and Diplomas (PGDip) are taught postgraduate courses at Level 7. They are the same level of study as a Masters Degree; however they are shorter duration and not worth as many credits.

### **Master's Degree**

A Master's Degree is the most commonly taken postgraduate qualification and they can be either taught or research-based. Full-time Master's Degrees usually involve one or two years of study, while part-time programmes can last up to four years. The two most common Master's Degrees are Master of Arts (MA) and Master of Science (MSc).

### **Doctorate Degree**

A Doctorate of Philosophy (PhD) is the highest level of Degree that a student can achieve. PhD students are required to independently conduct original and significant research in a specific field or subject, before producing a publication. Full-time PhDs typically last three to fours years, although they can be studied part-time.

# Understanding UCAS Points

If the career you're interested in requires a degree-level qualification, you may choose to attend University full-time, part-time, remotely or whilst completing a Degree or Higher Apprenticeship.

At 16, it may therefore be necessary to consider what entry requirements could be required to study a particular course or at a specific University so you know what subjects or qualifications to choose next and what grades you'll need to achieve.

UCAS Tariff points translate your qualifications and grades into a numerical value. Many qualifications (but not all) have a UCAS Tariff value, which will vary depending on the qualification level and the grade you achieve. This numerical value is used by University and HE Providers to assess whether you meet their entry requirements for a particular course.

Some Universities, Colleges and Conservatoires refer to UCAS Tariff points in their course entry requirements, but this doesn't mean they won't consider qualifications that don't appear on the Tariff - so make sure you check the course entry requirements carefully!



More information on the UCAS Tariff points system can be found on the UCAS website, where you can search Universities and HE Providers and the courses they offer to check what points or qualifications they require.





# Work Experience

Work experience is essential for getting a job. Whether it's a short or long work placement, paid or voluntary, experience gained in the workplace is always viewed favourably by employers.

It can also boost your confidence, help you to feel work-ready, as well as assist you in building up contacts and references for future job applications. It could be the thing that helps you decide what you would like to do for work.

# FINDING A WORK

There are lots of ways you can access a work placement, and it's a good idea to start off by making a list of careers and jobs that you are most interested in pursuing in the future so you have an

understanding of where would be best to look. If you already know what you're interested in doing, check whether any courses or qualifications require you to have workplace experience to further bolster your knowledge. Once you have this information, you can start your search.

If you need support, you can reach out to an advice service and they can give you information on local employers to approach, or may know of specific work placements available to you. Stockport has several organisations and schemes that can help you with this – please see the useful contacts page for details.

If you are happy to look independently, you can search for local companies that match your criteria and then begin reaching out. You could start by calling or emailing the manager or recruitment

department. It's a good idea to have a covering letter prepared which tells them a little about yourself, explains what type of placement you're looking for and why. Try and include some specific information about why you would like to gain your experience at their company, and talk about what you can bring them as a member of the team.

VIRTUAL WORK EXPERIENCE

Virtual Work Experience (VWEX) is an online work experience placement offered by an employer to give students and young people the opportunity to experience the world of work remotely without having to travel to the employer's office or base. This opens up lots of opportunities to try different work roles from your home, meaning you have a wider variety of placement opportunities by not being limited by travel.

EMPLOYMENT &

With the implementation of the Raising the Participation Age (RPA), you can still be employed, self-employed or a volunteer, as long as:

- You are working or volunteering for at least 20 hours a week
- You undertake at least 280 hours of accredited education/training a year

Part-time work or volunteering (e.g. evening or weekend jobs) is not affected by these requirements.

# PART-TIME DOBS WHILST STUDYING

As long as it doesn't take up too much time or interfere with your studies, finding a part-time job at 16 is a great way to earn money and gain skills and experience for your CV. If you have definite career plans, you may be able to find part-time work that is directly relevant. Otherwise, you can gain a variety of 'employability' skills through any part-time job. Common choices for students include working in retail, hospitality, catering, administration or leisure.
